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- DG SANTE and One Health
- Similar concepts worldwide
 - Not a single initiative or rigid structure
 - **OIE-WHO-FAO** and beyond
- In EU
 - Cooperation at all levels and in-between:
 - Within SANTE, with other DGs, globally, ...
 - Member States, EU agencies, Chief Vet Officers, Chief Medical Officers, ...
- For SANTE
 - **Overarching notion in our efforts**
 - EU is only tip of the iceberg
 - Our competencies, actions are framed by Treaty articles, subsidiarity, proportionality
- Other actions are vital
 - **Initiatives implementation**
 - **EU** rules and beyond
 - Complementary to EU











Human health – health in all policies

- One of the EU Health Strategy's principles is "Health in all policies"
- Human health is determined to a large extent by factors outside of direct remit of health policy
 - a holistic response is required
- Art. 168 TFEU:
 - 'a high level of human health protection shall be ensured in the definition and implementation of all EU policies and actions'
- Strengthening integration of health concerns
 - into all policies at Union and Member State levels
- Examples of this approach at EU level:
 - E.g. EU legislation on pesticides, AMR action plan







Decision 1082/2013/EU on serious cross border threats to health



Decision 1082/2013/EU for all threats

- Preparedness and response planning
 - Joint procurement of medical counter-measures
- Epidemic surveillance for communicable diseases
- Ad-hoc monitoring for bio-toxins chemicals and environmental threats
 - Early Warning and Response Systems
- Clarification of responsibility for risk assessments
 Strengthened coordination of preparedness and measures by a strong Health Security Committee
 - Risk and crisis communication as part of the response
- Recognition of emergency situation





- European Antibiotic Awareness Days




- Joint ECDC+EFSA+EMA report: consumption of ABs vs. AMR

Revision of the veterinary medicines legislation

- Developed with needs and characteristics of the veterinary sector in mind
- Key: to increase availability of veterinary medicines
- Addresses antimicrobial resistance
 - New legal tools
- Veterinarians' key role, e.g.
 - Prescriptions
 - Selling of antimicrobials (animals under your care)





Revision of the Medicated Feed (MF) legislation

- New rules on <u>production</u> of medicated feed:
 - Old rules are from 1990: impair efficient treatment of animals and availability of MF
 - Proposal aligns them to principles of feed hygiene (Regulation 183/2005).
- Improvement of <u>quality</u> of medicated feed.
 - setting EU-wide residue limits for AMs in ordinary feed (carry-over)
 - use of the Code of Good Manufacturing Practices
- Improvement of <u>use</u> of medicated feed.
 - more restrictive rules for prescribing and handling MF with AMs
 - no preventive use of MF
 - extension of the use of medicated feed to non-food producing animals






Future EU Regulation on animal health

- Created with One Health in mind
 - Takes into account the relationships between animal health, public health, environment, food and feed safety
- Criteria to list diseases for EU intervention
 - Contain all these aspects
- Better framework to handle emerging zoonoses
- Biosecurity and surveillance
 - Supports the fight against major zoonoses and AMR
 - More responsibility to animal keepers, vets
 - No change in detailed EU rules on Salmonella, zoonosis monitoring

Even wider...

- Avian flu by migrating wild birds
 - Ornithologists, environmentalists etc.
- Tuberculosis in wildlife
 - Interface with farmed bovine animals, humans
 - Eradication program(s)
- Wild boar spreading African swine fever
 - Hunters, forestry people
- Emerging animal pathogens vs. native fauna
 - Frogs, salamanders decimated by fungus





Enhanced crisis management in food, animals and plants

- To limit the effects on human health and avoid spread of hazards
 - E. coli crisis: 46 deaths; 782 HUS patients
- To limit the need for food re-calls, trade restrictions or other economic consequences
 - Loss during first two weeks: 812 mEUR,
 - Exports loss: 600 mEUR,
 - EC market support: 210 mEUR
- To agree on responsibilities and procedures beforehand
- To anticipate possible reactions of press and general public
 - Avian flu vs. "swine flu"
